Smoke-Free includes <u>anyone</u> on Housing Authority property:



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- Staff
- Residents
- Visitors & Guests
- Contractors

WHAT?

HALC's Smoke-Free policy prohibits:

- Smoking tobacco in any form
- Cigarettes, Pipes, Cigars, Hookah/Water Pipe
- E-Cigarettes, Vapor Devices, Nicotine Delivery Systems
- Cannabis (Marijuana) always has been prohibited.
- This includes medical Marijuana














- HUD requires all Public Housing agencies to put "Smoke-Free" policies into effect no later than July 30th, 2018.
- The Housing Authority for LaSalle County's Board of Commissioners has approved this policy to be in effect on

July 30, 2018

Smoke-Free is a requirement by HUD that prohibits smoking:

- Inside any Public Housing unit, home, or apartment
- Within 25 feet of buildings





WHY?

 The cost of unit turnover is higher in units where a tenant smoked vs. non-smoking units

It takes longer to clean, prime, and paint a unit that has

been smoked in



What is HUD's "Smoke-Free" policy all about? (Continued) WHY?

- Secondhand smoke causes approximately 7,330 deaths from lung cancer and 33,950 deaths from heart disease each year.¹
- There is no risk-free level of exposure to secondhand smoke and even short-term exposure potentially can increase the risk of heart attacks.²

There is no safe level of secondhand smoke exposure



Secondhand smoke can travel within multiunit housing and common areas through door ways, cracks in walls, electrical lines, ventilation systems and plumbing.



Opening windows and using fans does not completely remove secondhand smoke.



Heating, air conditioning and ventilation systems cannot eliminate exposure to secondhand smoke.


(Continued) WHY?

- In 2011, U.S. fire departments responded to an estimated 90,000 smoking-material fires.
- These fires resulted in an estimated 540 civilian deaths, 1,640 civilian injuries and \$621 million in direct property damage₍₁₎

- 1) Board Approved Changes to ACOP March 14,2018
- 2) New Leases & Resident Handbooks May-July, 2018
- 3) Smoke-Free Policy & Leases effective -July 30, 2018
- 4) 5-Step Enforcement Begins -August 1, 2018



HOW?

5-Step Enforcement

- 1) Verbal Warning + File Note + Mail Cessation Info
- Notice of Lease Violation Letter
- 3) Third Warning to include Meeting with Tenant
- 4) Notice to Vacate on 4th Violation*
 - *May allow tenant to cure if they agree to no further violations.
- 5) Notice to Vacate Lease is Terminated


What is HUD's "Smoke-Free" policy all about? REASONABLE ACCOMMODATIONS

- The act of smoking is NOT a disability under the ADA
- Persons who smoke are NOT a protected class
- Reasonable Accommodations cannot be made to allow tenants to smoke inside the building or in their apartment





Smoking Cessation Assistance

- HUD's Smoke-Free does not require tenants to quit smoking; it prohibits smoking indoors and within 25 feet of the building
- HUD actively encourages tenants who wish to stop smoking to take advantage of smoking cessation programs
- Recipients of Medicare and Medicaid may be eligible for smoking cessation products at reduced or no cost
- Other healthcare plans may also offer cessation assistance as part of your plan. Contact your healthcare provider for more information



Cigarette smoking is one of the greatest drivers of adverse health outcomes and costs for state Medicaid programs. By investing in comprehensive tobacco cessation programs, states have reduced smoking rates and health care costs and have improved health outcomes. Tobacco treatment is one of the most costeffective preventive services with as much as a \$2-\$3 return on every dollar invested. CMS encourages our state partners to pursue these outcomes by:

- · Using Medicaid administrative funding to enhance quitlines;
- · Implementing mandatory coverage of tobacco cessation counseling for pregnant women and providing cessation services for all other Medicaid beneficiaries; and
- Ensuring coverage of all FDA-approved tobacco cessation medications.



Note: the Affordable Care Act requires all Medicaid programs cover all tobacco cessation medications beginning January 1, 2014. If a medication is marked here as not being covered, there is not yet evidence that Medicaid has complied with this requirement. Patients should call their Medicaid program and ask how to receive these medications.

OTHER CHANGES...

RENT ~ PAYING YOUR RENT: NEW CHANGES

Currently in Effect

 Repeated Court Cases for non-payment: The filing of 3 complaints for non-payment of rent within a 12-month period will result in Termination of Tenancy

Effective July 30, 2018

 Rent is Due on the 1st day of each month and must be paid in full by the 5th day of the month
